





# **PROJECT AREA**



## **Recommended Street Section**

Only one roadway cross-section was proposed. The proposed design ultimately may be refined as part of future redevelopment processes, depending on available right-of-way. If less than 80 feet of right-of-way is available, some elements of the design may be narrowed or eliminated as shown in the table below.

Element Width
Travel lanes...........0-12'
Bike lanes...........8'
Parallel parking.....8'
Planting strips......4-6'
Sidewalks......8'
Total...........60-80'

A traffic calming circle could serve as a gateway feature and a way for drivers to turn around in this area. The design of the traffic circle will depend on whether or not it includes a gateway feature and whether it will need to accommodate large trucks.

No key intersections were evaluated in this segment.



## **SEGMENT 2.1: VENEER PROPERTY**


## **Recommended Intersection**

Several options for improving this intersection were identified and evaluated. The project team narrowed them down to four options for evaluation. Based on further analysis and discussion with members of the advisory committee, Planning Commission, City Council and other community members, the project team developed a new preferred option.

This roundabout design allows for continued direct travel to both Old Portland Road and Plymouth Street. It has a smaller footprint than the other roundabout options evaluated, with less resulting impact on surrounding private properties and a lower cost to build compared to the earlier roundabouts studied.

Truck movements through the Plymouth Street/Old Portland Road intersection have been a key topic of discussion, and the roundabout has been designed to accommodate these vehicles through sufficient size and a mountable apron. The roundabout center is recommended to be non-mountable in order to provide space for a gateway feature.





## INTERSECTION: OLD PORTLAND ROAD & PLYMOUTH STREET

## **Recommended Street Section**

A new preferred option was identified for Old Portland Road through further discussion and refinement of the preliminary preferred option with members of the advisory committee, Planning Commission, City Council and other community members.

It includes one-way cycletracks on both sides of the street. The cycletracks are separated from the roadway by a landscaping strip. Each cycletrack will be separated from the adjacent pedestrian walkway by a curb or other means.

The new option has the same safety benefits of the original Option C but can be transitioned from adjacent segments more effectively. Implementation of this option will require careful planning to allow for safe convenient transitions between this design and sections of the roadway that have undergone recent improvements.





## **SEGMENT 4.1: OLD PORTLAND ROAD**

## **Recommended Intersection**

At the intersection of Old Portland Rd. and Kaster Rd. Option B (roundabout) is the preferred design, allowing for throughmovement in all directions without queueing at a signal.

The roundabout serves as both a traffic calming function and as a gateway treatment while providing capacity comparable to a signalized intersection with separate left-turn lanes on all approaches.





INTERSECTION: OLD PORTLAND ROAD & KASTER ROAD


## **Recommended Intersections**

For clarity the recommended intersections of Old Portland Road with Gable Road and Port Avenue are shown together. In the Evaluation section on pages 66 through 72, the options for these two intersections were shown and evaluated separately.

#### Old Portland Road & Gable Road


Several options for improving this intersection were identified and narrowed to two options for evaluation. Both options performed well in the evaluation; however, Option B performed slightly better. Based on further review and discussion with the project management team, Option B is the preferred near-term alternative.

- Option B provides greater separation from the railroad crossing as well as the Old Portland Road/Railroad Avenue and Old Portland Road/Port Avenue intersections relative to Option A.
- Option B, coupled with the planned improvements along Gable Road, provides a greater improvement in traffic operations (volume/capacity, delay, LOS) at the intersection relative to Option A.
- Option B does not require a traffic signal to achieve acceptable traffic

operations in the future and therefore, costs significantly less relative to Option A.

The City should monitor changes in traffic and travel performance after improvements to the US 30/Millard Road intersection are implemented and/or other measures are successful in encouraging more drivers to use Old Portland Road to access the Riverfront area.

At the point that increased potential traffic on Old Portland Road warrants investment in additional improvements to this intersection, Option A may be evaluated further.

Consider incorporating protected intersection treatment options to improve transitions through the intersection and to the shared-use path at Old Portland Road.

#### Old Portland Road and Port Avenue

At the intersection of Old Portland Road and Port Avenue, Option B (Re-Align with Two-Way Left-Turn Lane) is preferred. Option A is problematic from a transportation safety and mobility standpoint.

Consider incorporating protected intersection treatment options to improve transitions through the intersection.

## **Recommended Street Section**

A new preferred option was identified through further discussion and review with members of the advisory committee, Planning Commission, City Council and other community members. It includes oneway cycletracks on both sides of the street.

The cycletracks are separated from the roadway by a landscaping strip. Each cycletrack will be separated from the adjacent pedestrian walkway by a curb or other means. The new option has the same safety benefits of the original Option C but can be transitioned from adjacent segments more effectively.

Implementation of this option will require careful planning to allow for safe convenient transitions between this design and sections of the roadway that have undergone recent improvements. Typical transitions will be illustrated in the Riverfront Connector Plan.

This cross-section also includes a center lane to accommodate turn lanes needed at key intersections or other access points to maintain traffic mobility. A landscaped median could be used in short portions of this segment but will need to be located to continue to ensure access to local businesses in this part of the corridor.

#### INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide draft policies and code language that will implement the recommended site and urban design elements of the St. Helens Riverfront Connector Plan as detailed in the Riverfront Connector Plan Design Options & Evaluation Report. These elements are listed in Table 1, along with a brief description and notes about their implementation. The list of items in Table 1 is drawn from the scope of work for the Riverfront Connector Project. It includes some items that will not be addressed in detail through this process because it was determined that other planning documents, such as the Riverfront Framework Plan or others are sufficient to address those items. In other cases, specific comprehensive plan or development code amendments are proposed and included with reference numbers later in this memorandum.

#### **Reference 1:** New Cross Sections & Intersection Design

The most central component of the Riverfront Connector Plan is its set of recommended street cross-sections and intersections for the study corridor. There are two options proposed for implementation of the Riverfront Connector Plan's recommended cross-sections: (1) Update the Transportation System Plan with new maps and figures for these street designs and intersections, or (2) adopt the Riverfront Connector Plan as part of the City's Comprehensive Plan.

The City opted for something akin to option 2 for the 2015 US30 & Columbia Blvd./St. Helens Blvd. corridor plan. This approach for the Riverfront Connector Plan would use language as follows.

This language adds a section to the comprehensive plan that adopts the Riverfront Connector plan by reference and clarifies that language within the Riverfront Connector Plan supersedes other information in the Waterfront Development Prioritization Plan and the Waterfront Framework Plan. This is a similar approach to what was used to include the US30/Columbia Boulevard/St Helens Street corridor master plan.

#### 19.33 Riverfront Connector Plan

- (1) The city hereby adopts the St. Helens Riverfront Connector Plan, attached to the ordinance codified in this chapter as Attachment "A" and made part of this reference, as an addendum to the St. Helens Comprehensive Plan (this title).
- (2) Where goals, policies, or regulations differ between the St. Helens Riverfront Connector Plan, the Waterfront Development Prioritization Plan, or the Riverfront Framework Plan, the St. Helens Riverfront Connector Plan shall apply.

This language adds a policy to the Transportation Goals and Policies section of the Comprehensive Plan (SHMC Title 19) to provide flexibility in roadway design for the Riverfront Area with the purpose of providing public benefit.

#### 19.08.040 Transportation Goals and Policies

q. Provide flexibility in roadway design within the Riverfront Area in order to allow for innovative, pedestrian-friendly spaces that provide adequate transportation capacity and service for all modes of travel, allow for financially feasible development of land, and offer public benefits to St. Helens residents, business owners, and visitors.

# **Reference 2:** Comprehensive Plan Amendments to Urban Growth Boundary Goals and Policies

This language amends policies for the area within the Urban Growth Boundary to ensure coordination with the County and consistency with the Riverfront Connector Plan.

#### 19.12.010 Urban growth boundary goals and policies.

(e) Review all subdivision plats <u>and development proposals</u> in the growth area to ensure the establishment of a safe and efficient road system <u>consistent with planning efforts in the growth area to date.</u>

#### Reference 3: Development Code Amendments to Implement Street Cross-Sections

Street improvements are regulated by SHMC 17.152.030 – Streets. Subsection (5) describes minimum rights-of-way and street widths, and Figure 19 lists standard widths and lanes by roadway functional classification.

The language below clarifies that a "city-initiated corridor plan" (i.e. the Riverfront Connector Plan or the US30 & Columbia Boulevard/St Helens Corridor plan) may also regulate street and ROW-widths, without including additional cross sections in the code.

(5) Minimum Rights-of-Way and Street Widths. Unless otherwise indicated on an approved street plan or city-initiated corridor plan, or as needed to continue an existing improved street, street right-of-way and roadway widths shall not be less than the minimum width described in Figure 19. Where a range is indicated, the width shall be determined by the decision-making authority based upon anticipated average daily traffic (ADT) on the new street segment. (The city council may adopt, by resolution, design standards for street construction and other public improvements. The design standards will provide guidance for determining improvement requirements within the specified ranges.) (See "City of St. Helens Engineering Department Public Facilities Construction Standards Manual.")

The language below adds a sub-section to the Street and Utility Improvement standards allowing for the cross-sections created for the Riverfront Connector Plan (and other similar planning efforts) to be utilized in other parts of the City.

(28) Special Street Designs. City-initiated corridor plans and other planning efforts have yielded special street designs intended to apply along specific street segments within the City. An applicant may request, or the Director may require, these designs be utilized in other parts of the city where transportation conditions and street functional classifications are the same as those within the plan area.

#### Reference 4: Fee-in-Lieu Requirements

The City of St. Helens currently allows a fee-in-lieu rather than constructing sidewalk improvements, as regulated by SHMC 17.152.060(6) Sidewalks. The City wishes to provide an option – and calculate fees for – the full cost of roadway improvements rather than just sidewalks. The following code language strikes the language from Sidewalks and adds a new section to Chapter 17.152. Draft language is based in part on code requirements found in the Dundee, Oregon Development Code.

#### 17.152.060 Sidewalks and other frontage improvements

- (1) Sidewalks shall be constructed, replaced or repaired to city design standards as set forth in the standard specifications manual and located as follows:
- (a) On both sides of arterial and collector streets to be built at the time of street construction;
- (b) On both sides of all other streets and in pedestrian easements and rights-of-way, except as provided further in this section or per SHMC 17.152.030(1)(d), to be constructed along all portions of the property designated for pedestrian ways in conjunction with development of the property.
- (2) A planter strip separation of at least five feet between the curb and the sidewalk shall be required in the design of any arterial or collector street, except where the following conditions exist: there is inadequate right-of-way; the curbside sidewalks already exist on predominant portions of the street; it would conflict with the utilities; or as indicated otherwise by the transportation systems plan (TSP) (see TSP Figures 7-2 and 7-3) or an adopted street plan.
- (3) Maintenance. Maintenance of sidewalks, curbs, and planter strips is the continuing obligation of the adjacent property owner.

- (4) Application for Permit and Inspection. If the construction of a sidewalk is not included in a performance bond of an approved subdivision or the performance bond has lapsed, then every person, firm or corporation desiring to construct sidewalks as provided by this chapter shall, before entering upon the work or improvement, apply for a street opening permit to the engineering department to so build or construct:
- (a) An occupancy permit shall not be issued for a development until the provisions of this section are satisfied or a fee in lieu has been paid to the city pursuant to subsection (6) of this section;
- (b) The city engineer may issue a permit and certificate allowing temporary noncompliance with the provisions of this section to the owner, builder or contractor when, in his <u>or her</u> opinion, the construction of the sidewalk is impractical for one or more of the following reasons:
- (i) Sidewalk grades have not and cannot be established for the property in question within a reasonable length of time;
- (ii) Forthcoming installation of public utilities or street paving would be likely to cause severe damage to the new sidewalk;
- (iii) Street right-of-way is insufficient to accommodate a sidewalk on one or both sides of the street; or
- (iv) Topography or elevation of the sidewalk base area makes construction of a sidewalk impractical or economically infeasible;
- (c) The city engineer shall inspect the construction of sidewalks <u>and frontage improvements</u> for compliance with the provision set forth in the standard specifications manual.
- (5) Council Initiation of Construction. In the event one or more of the following situations are found by the council to exist, the council may adopt a resolution to initiate construction of a sidewalk and other frontage improvements in accordance with city ordinances:
- (a) A safety hazard exists for children walking to or from school and sidewalks are necessary to eliminate the hazard;
- (b) A safety hazard exists for pedestrians walking to or from a public building, commercial area, place of assembly or other general pedestrian traffic, and sidewalks are necessary to eliminate the hazard;
- (c) Fifty percent or more of the area in a given block has been improved by the construction of dwellings, multiple dwellings, commercial buildings or public buildings and/or parks; and
- (d) A criterion which allowed noncompliance under subsection (4)(b) of this section no longer exists and a sidewalk could be constructed in conformance with city standards.
- (6) Fee in Lieu Option. An applicant may request or the city may require the applicant to pay a fee in lieu of constructing sidewalks to be approved by the city engineer.

- (a) A fee in lieu may be approved given conditions including but not limited to the following:
  - (i) There is no existing or planned sidewalk network in the area.
- (ii) There is a planned sidewalk or multi-use pathway in the vicinity of the site, or an existing multi-use pathway stubbing into the site, that would provide better pedestrian connectivity.
- (iii) When physical improvements are present along an existing or proposed street that would prevent a reasonable installation within the right-of-way.
- (iv) When sidewalks <u>and other frontage improvements</u> would be located on land with cross slopes greater than nine percent, or other conditions that would create a potential hazard.
  - (v) Other situations unique to the site.
- (b) The fee shall be not less than 125 percent of the cost to perform the work, as determined by the city engineer, based on the applicable city standards in effect at the time of application. Or the city engineer may require the applicant's engineer to provide a cost estimate subject to review and approval by the city, to determine the cost to perform the work. The fee shall be paid prior to plat recording or issuance of a building or development permit.
- (c) All fees paid shall be used for construction of a sidewalk <u>and/or other related frontage</u> <u>improvements</u> or multi-use pathway or repair and maintenance of an existing sidewalk <u>and/or related frontage improvements</u> or pathway within the city of St. Helens.

#### 17.152.060 Definitions

Add the following definition for "Frontage Improvement."

"Frontage improvement" means any improvement within the right-of-way along the frontage of a parcel of land, including but not limited to construction or widening of travel lanes, on-street parking areas, sidewalks, bicycle lanes, multi-use paths, landscaping strips, street trees, stormwater treatment facilities, or other utilities located within the right-of-way.

#### **DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS**

#### Bailey Subdivision

Completed second review of plans for the public improvements for a new 18-lot subdivision located between Sykes Road and Westboro Way. Plans were returned to the design engineer for additional revisions.

#### Emerald Meadows Subdivision Construction Permit

Waiting for paperwork from the Developer in regards to the sidewalk bond. The Council approved recording of the plat with the provision that no building permits would be issued until the sidewalk bond is in place.

#### Elk Ridge Estates Phase VI

The Engineer of Record has prepared the as-built drawings but they have not been formally submitted. The warranty bond documents have been provided to the Developer. Once the as-builts and warranty bond are provided and accepted, the plat can be signed and recorded.

#### New Medical Building Construction

Status is the same as last month: Work on the frontage improvements has started, which will include a widened street, curb, sidewalk, and a new storm drain on McBride Street. The Contractor has found a conflict with the natural gas main and is working on revising the storm drain pipe alignment to minimize the issue.

#### Columbia County Education Campus

Met with the Contractor and School District to review any outstanding items that need to be addressed before they can be issued a Temporary Occupancy Permit for the CCEC building. The District's goal is to have students move to this building after the Christmas break. There is still a lot of items left to be finished in the building, but the public improvement portion of the work for required for the CCEC building are complete.

#### First Street Improvements

Only the paving remains to be completed for the improvements on First Street, a short County right-of-way off of Highway 30 south of Les Schwab. The Developer is required to extend the water main, storm drainage system, widen the road, and extend sidewalk along his frontage.

#### SANITARY SEWER AND STORM DRAIN PROJECTS

#### S. 10<sup>th</sup> Street Storm Drain Reroute Project

The successful contractor, Emery & Sons, is scheduled to start work after the first of the year. They have started the material submittal process.

## S. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street Sanitary Sewer Extension

Waiting to finalize the short sanitary sewer main extension on S. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, north of St. Helens Street. The project engineer will be required to submit testing results and as-built documentation before the City will accept the work.

#### Greystone Estates Sanitary Sewer Relocation

The Developer is moving forward with the sanitary sewer main relocation and a preconstruction meeting was held with the City, Contractor, Developer, and subcontractors. Work is scheduled to start after the start of the new year. Their plan is to blast out the new trench line and they have submitted some of the required documentation for review. Additional measures are required such as holding a neighborhood meeting and providing insurance documentation.

#### Bradley Street Sanitary Sewer Extension

No change in status: Reviewed plans for review for a short sanitary sewer extension on Bradley Street to serve a home proposed to be constructed. Revised plans have not been re-submitted.

#### STREET AND TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS

#### Gable Road Improvement Project

Attended a meeting with the Design Engineering Team and the County to review the 90% drawings, and completed a walk-through of the entire project. Revisions are now being incorporated into the final bid set. The target time period to bid is at the beginning of 2019 and have a contractor ready to get started in mid-2019.

#### Street Trench Patching Project

This contract is still open but no new activity has taken place since early November.

#### Wayfinding Installation Project

Reviewed proposals from six firms submitted for the Wayfinding Signage Installation Project, Phase I; collaborated with Planning staff and a volunteer City Councilor to make a recommendation for the contractor selection. This is a grant funded project that will initiate installation of various vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian signage along Columbia Boulevard, St. Helens Street, S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street, and install one informational kiosk in the Plaza downtown.

#### MISCELLANEOUS PROJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

#### Right-of-Way and Construction Permits

There were five Right-of-Way/Construction permit issued in November 2018: two to NW Natural for new service installations; one for a mailbox installation; and two to review engineering plans for public improvements required for developments.

#### Miscellaneous Projects

Met with a potential buyer/industrial user for the Armstrong property. Discussed use of public facilities in conjunction with the proposed use and redevelopment of the site.

Attended a pre-application meeting for a potential commercial building with two businesses in the McBride Commercial Development (former Violet's Villa site).

Continuing to work with Planning, Parks, and Public Works staff to implement various improvements in the Parks.

#### **Training Workshops and Committee Meetings**

Director attended the monthly Columbia County Traffic Safety Commission meeting.

Water Production: 36.3 million gallons, which averages 1.21 million gallons per day

Week 1 Produced and sent October OHA reports to the State. Performed monthly check on fire extinguishers. Sent sewer readings to Columbia City public works. Changed out Chlorine monitor reagents. Received new Cl17 monitor reagents from HACH. Neutralization Pump #2 still being repaired, Northwest controls on site and finished the repair to our radiant heating system.

Week 2, Beckwith and Kuffel notified us that our pump is ready for shipment, should be here next week.

Week 3 Ordered chlorine for next week. Blowing leaves from driveway and pedestrian/bike trail. Received our rebuilt Neutralization pump and when installing the pump back into service, learned that the new pump has a different mounting configuration that raises the flange up 1" higher than the rigid plumbing that supplies the pump. We will have to modify the pump mounting pedestal so the pump lines up with the existing hard piped flanges. This will take some planning and reworking to the mounting pedestal to get the pump back into service. Tim has ordered a stainless steel plate that will be mounted on the existing pump pedestal reddy-rod studs. The plate will allow us to raise or lower the height of the motor to line up with the existing rigid plumbing configuration. This renovation will require that we chisel off the raised mortar plateau that was poured on top of the solid concrete pump foundation pedestal, expose the 4 mounting studs that come up through the mortared plateau from the poured concrete pedestal base, we then replace the poured mortar plateau with the stainless plate. Using the threaded nuts on the reddy-rod studs, we create a floating, adjustable motor mounting platform that allows customizing the height, and the leveling, of the pump

Week 4. Received chlorine delivery. Tim has created a parts list to replace and repair some chlorine feed lines that have started to leak at the glued joints from being exposed to chlorine for 13 years.
