# City of St. Helens ORDINANCE NO. 3238

## AN ORDINANCE TO ANNEX AND DESIGNATE THE ZONE OF CERTAIN PROPERTY AT 2225 GABLE ROAD

**WHEREAS**, applicant Brent and Dawn Paintner have requested to annex to the City of St. Helens certain property at 2225 Gable Road. This property is also described per **Exhibit A** and depicted per **Exhibit B**; and

WHEREAS, the applicant has consented in writing to the proposed annexation; and

- WHEREAS, the applicant constitutes 1) all the owners of the property to be annexed, and 2) more than half of the owners of the property to be annexed own more than half of such property representing more than half of the assessed value pursuant to ORS 222.170(1); and
- **WHEREAS**, the City Council must determine the incorporated Comprehensive Plan Map designation and the Zone Map designation; and
- **WHEREAS**, appropriate notice has been given and a public hearing was held May 15, 2019 on the annexation proposal; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Council has considered findings of compliance with criteria and law applicable to the proposal.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF ST. HELENS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1**. The above recitations are true and correct and are incorporated herein by this reference.
- <u>Section 2</u>. The property described in **Exhibit A** and depicted in **Exhibit B** is hereby accepted for annexation to the City of St. Helens.
- **Section 3.** The St. Helens Zoning Ordinance Map is hereby amended to reflect that the property described herein shall be zoned General Commercial, GC.
- **Section 4.** The St. Helens Comprehensive Plan Map is hereby amended to reflect that the property described herein shall be designated as General Commercial, GC.
- <u>Section 5</u>. In support of the above annexation and amendments described herein, the Council hereby adopts the Annexation A.1.19 Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, attached hereto as **Exhibit C** and made part of this reference.
- **Section 6.** The City Council does hereby refer the final decision to annex this property to the voters of the City of St. Helens.
- **Section 7**. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be 30 days after approval, in accordance with the City Charter and other applicable laws.

#### EXHIBIT A

#### LEGAL DESCRIPTION

A parcel of land located in the SE ¼ of the NE ¼ of Section 8, Township 4 N., Range 1 W., Willamette Meridian, Columbia County, Oregon, most specifically described as follows:

Beginning at a point, the **True Point of Beginning**, where the Southerly right-of-way line of Gable Road and the Westerly right-of-way line of McNulty Way intersect;

Thence, South 12°43'55" West, along the Westerly right-of-way line of McNulty Way, a distance of 145.52 feet;

Thence, South 64°16'55" West, along said Westerly right-of-way line, a distance of 108.61 feet;

Thence and leaving said right-of-way line, North 25°43'05" West, a distance of 67.18 feet;

Thence, North 81°46'27" West, a distance of 52.02 feet;

Thence, North 02°04'13" East, a distance of 175.80 feet to the Southerly right-of-way line of Gable Road;

Thence along said Southerly right-of-way line, along a 5,769.58 foot radius curve (chord bearing South 75°02'12" East a distance of 211.38 feet), a curve distance of 211.39 feet to the **True Point of Beginning**.

**APPLICANT:** Brent & Dawn Paintner

**OWNERS:** Paintner Holdings LLC

**ZONING:** Columbia County's General Commercial, C-3

**LOCATION:** 2225 Gable Road, 4N1W-8AD-500

**PROPOSAL:** The property owner filed consent to annex to develop/use the property using City

standards

#### SITE INFORMATION / BACKGROUND

The subject property is an irregular-shaped corner lot at approximately 1.03 acres. It is made up of four (4) parcels which have restrictive covenant that ties them together via Inst. No. 2018-010123. It abuts Gable Road and McNulty Way. The parcel is accessed by Gable Road by two paved asphalt driveway approaches. Gable Road is a developed minor arterial-classified street without frontage improvements (sidewalks, curb, landscape strip) on either side. McNulty Way is a collector-classified developed street without frontage improvements (sidewalks, curb, landscape strip) on either side.

The parcel is developed with an existing 1,800 sq. ft. commercial office and a 2,000 sq. ft. shop. Both commercial buildings utilize a gravel parking lot. The site is not currently hooked up to City sanitary sewer or water, although they are available in the abutting rights-of-way. The parcel is relatively flat with a steeper downward slope close to the border of McNulty Creek near the southern property line and the existing shop building. Portions of the property near the creek are located in the 100-year flood-plain.

#### **Abutting Zoning**

North - City's General Commercial (GC) East - County's Light Manufacturing (M-2) South - City's Light Industrial (LI) West - City's General Commercial (GC)

#### PUBLIC HEARING & NOTICE

Hearing dates are as follows: April 9, 2019 before the Planning Commission and May 15, 2019 before the City Council.

At their April 9, 2019 hearing, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of this proposal.

Notice of this proposal was sent to surrounding property owners within 300 feet of the subject properties on March 21, 2019 via first class mail. Notice was sent to agencies by mail or e-mail on the same date. Notice was published in the <u>The Chronicle</u> on March 21, 2019. Notice was sent to the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development on March 4, 2019 via e-mail.

#### APPLICABLE CRITERIA, ANALYSIS & FINDINGS

#### SHMC 17.08.040 (1) – Quasi-judicial amendment and standards criteria

- (a) A recommendation or a decision to approve, approve with conditions, or to deny an application for a quasi-judicial amendment shall be based on all of the following standards:
  - (i) The applicable comprehensive plan policies and map designation; and that the change will not adversely affect the health, safety, and welfare of the community; and
  - (ii) The applicable Oregon Statewide Planning Goals adopted under ORS Chapter 197, until acknowledgment of the comprehensive plan and ordinances; and
  - (iii) The standards applicable of any provision of this code or other applicable implementing ordinance.
- (b) Consideration may also be given to:
  - (i) Any applicable evidence of change in the neighborhood or community or a mistake or inconsistency in the comprehensive plan or zoning map as it relates to the property which is the subject of the development application.

**Discussion:** (a)(i) The Comprehensive Plan designation for the subject property is Unincorporated General Commercial (UGC). Applicable designation and zoning district for annexation are discussed later.

There is no known conflict with the general Comprehensive Plan policies identified in Chapter 19.08 SHMC. Note that SHMC 19.08.030 discusses public services and facilities and includes utility provisions (e.g., water and sewer) as well as services such as police and library. In sum, all services are intertwined; the consent to annexation allows connection to City sewer to support existing and future development on the subject property, and, once annexed, all other City services/facilities. By this process, the proposal complies with this aspect of the Comprehensive Plan.

There is no known conflict with the specific Comprehensive Plan policies identified in Chapter 19.12 SHMC.

There is no known conflict with the addendums to the Comprehensive Plan which includes Economic Opportunities Analysis (Ord. No. 3101), Waterfront Prioritization Plan (Ord. No. 3148), the Transportation Systems Plan (Ord. No. 3150), the Corridor Master Plan (Ord. No. 3181), and the Parks & Trails Master Plan (Ord. No. 3191).

Finally, there is no evidence that this proposal will be contrary to the health, safety and welfare of the community.

(a)(ii) The City's Comprehensive Plan has been adopted by the State, thus, the applicable Oregon Statewide Planning Goals adopted under ORS Chapter 197 do not need to be analyzed per this section.

(a)(iii) In addition, Section 3 of the City's Charter states that "annexation, delayed or otherwise, to the City of St. Helens, may only be approved by a prior majority vote among the electorate." However, during the 2016 Legislative Assembly, Senate Bill 1578 was passed. It states that a City shall annex the territory without submitting the proposal to the electors if certain criteria are met:

- 1. Property is within the UGB
- 2. Property will be subject to the City's Comprehensive Plan
- 3. Property is contiguous to the City limits or is separated by only a public right of way or body of water
- 4. Property conforms to all other City requirements

As this proposal meets these criteria, this property will not be subject to a majority vote among the electorate.

Other provisions applicable to this proposal are discussed elsewhere herein.

(b) There is no evidence of a change in neighborhood, or mistake or inconstancy in the Comprehensive Plan or Zoning Map.

**Finding**: The quasi-judicial amendment and standards criteria are met.

#### SHMC 17.08.060 – Transportation planning rule compliance

- (1) Review of Applications for Effect on Transportation Facilities. A proposed comprehensive plan amendment, zone change or land use regulation change, whether initiated by the city or by a private interest, shall be reviewed to determine whether it significantly affects a transportation facility, in accordance with OAR 660-012-0060 (the Transportation Planning Rule ("TPR")). "Significant" means the proposal would:
  - (a) Change the functional classification of an existing or planned transportation facility (exclusive of correction of map errors in an adopted plan);
  - (b) Change standards implementing a functional classification system; or
  - (c) As measured at the end of the planning period identified in the adopted transportation system plan:
    - (i) Allow land uses or levels of development that would result in types or levels of travel or access that are inconsistent with the functional classification of an existing or planned transportation facility;
    - (ii) Reduce the performance of an existing or planned transportation facility below the minimum acceptable performance standard identified in the TSP; or
    - (iii) Worsen the performance of an existing or planned transportation facility that is otherwise projected to perform below the minimum acceptable performance standard identified in the TSP or comprehensive plan.
- (2) Amendments That Affect Transportation Facilities. Comprehensive plan amendments, zone changes or land use regulations that significantly affect a transportation facility shall ensure that allowed land uses are consistent with the function, capacity, and level of service of the facility identified in the TSP. This shall be accomplished by one or a combination of the following:
  - (a) Adopting measures that demonstrate allowed land uses are consistent with the planned function, capacity, and performance standards of the transportation facility.

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- (b) Amending the TSP or comprehensive plan to provide transportation facilities, improvements or services adequate to support the proposed land uses consistent with the requirements of OAR 660-012-0060.
- (c) Altering land use designations, densities, or design requirements to reduce demand for vehicle travel and meet travel needs through other modes of transportation.
- (d) Amending the TSP to modify the planned function, capacity or performance standards of the transportation facility.
- (3) Traffic Impact Analysis. A traffic impact analysis shall be submitted with a plan amendment or zone change application, as applicable, pursuant to Chapter <u>17.156</u> SHMC.

**Discussion:** This section reflects State law regarding the Transportation Planning Rule (TPR): <u>Transportation Planning Rule (TPR)</u>, OAR 660, Division 12. The TPR requires that where an amendment to a functional plan, an acknowledged comprehensive plan, or a land use regulation would significantly affect an existing or planned transportation facility, the local government shall put in place measures to assure that allowed land uses are consistent with the identified function, capacity, and performance standards of the facility. **Current zoning of the property is Columbia County's General Commercial, C-3 and the City zoning option given annexation is General Commercial (GC).** 

Generally, when comparing potential land use impact on transportation facilities, the *reasonable* worst case scenario for the existing and proposed designation/zone are considered. The potential land uses are very similar for both the City and County. The City's zoning is comparable to the County with regards to the possible intensity of uses allowed and potential vehicular trips generated. Thus, this proposal will not affect an existing or planned transportation facility.

**Finding**: No transportation facility will be significantly affected by this proposal. No traffic impact analysis is warranted.

#### SHMC 17.28.030 (1) – Annexation criteria

- (a) Adequate public facilities are available to the area and have sufficient capacity to provide service for the proposed annexation area; and
- (b) Comply with comprehensive plan amendment standards and zoning ordinance amendment standards and not be in conflict with applicable comprehensive plan policies and implementing ordinances: and
- (c) Complies with state laws; and
- (d) Abutting roads must meet city standards or property owner will be required to sign and record an irrevocable consent to local improvement district; and
- (e) Property exceeding 10 acres in gross size must show a need on the part of the city for such land if it is designated residential (e.g., less than five years' supply of like designated lands in current city limits).

**Discussion:** (a) Water - Currently, the site is not connected to City water. Although, it is available in the McNulty Way right-of-way. The City's current water capacity is 6 million gallons/day and the peak flow, usually in the summer, is 3 to 4 million gallons/day. Additionally, the City has the capacity of approximately 10 million gallons to meet future demands. Any additional uses that occur on the subject property can be accommodated by the City's municipal water system as infrastructure has substantial capacity available.

**Sewer** - The site is not currently connected to City sewer. There is a City sewer line in the Gable Road right-of-way abutting the property. With regards to capacity, the City's waste water treatment plant currently has the capacity (physically and as permitted by DEQ) to handle 50,000 pounds of Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD), which is the "loading" or potency of the wastewater received by the plant. The average daily BOD is well below this at only 1,500 pounds. Thus, any potential uses that occur on the subject property can be accommodated by the City's sanitary sewer system as infrastructure is in place or can be upgraded and there is substantial capacity available.

**Transportation** - As described above, this proposal poses no significant impact on a transportation facility.

Adequate public facilities are available to the area and have sufficient capacity to provide service for the proposed annexation area.

(b) The existing land use of the subject property is an office and a shop of some kind. The office is an allowed use in the General Commercial zone. The shop *may* be considered a non-conforming use once annexed into the City. The City's Development Code allows nonconforming uses to continue provided the use is not destroyed, discontinued or abandoned (see Chapter 17.104 SHMC). If the subject property redevelops or is developed further in the future, existing uses will be confirmed in more detail at that time.

There is no known conflict with the Comprehensive Plan and implementing ordinances.

(c) With regards to Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS), city annexations of territory must be undertaken consistent with ORS 222.111 to 222.183.

Pursuant to ORS 222.111(1), a City may only annex territory that is not within another City, and the territory must either be contiguous to the annexing City or be separated from the City only by a body of water or public right-of-way. The subject property is not within another City's jurisdiction and City of St. Helens corporate limits lies on two sides of the subject property.

Although undertaking an annexation is authorized by state law, the manner in which a city proceeds with annexation is also dictated in the city charter. ORS 222.111(1) references a city's charter as well as other ORS. St. Helens' Charter requirements pertaining to annexations are noted above.

Per ORS 222.111(2) an annexation may be initiated by the owner of real property or the city council. This annexation request was initiated by the property owner. Further, ORS 222.125 requires that that all property owners of the subject property to be annexed and at least half of the electors residing on the property consent in writing to the annexation. These documents were submitted with the annexation application.

ORS 197.175(1) suggests that all annexations are subject to the statewide planning goals. The statewide planning goals that could technically apply or relate to this proposal are Goals 1, 2, 11 and 12.

#### • Statewide Planning Goal 1: Citizen Involvement.

Goal 1 requires the development of a citizen involvement program that is widespread, allows two-way communication, provides for citizen involvement through all planning phases, and is understandable, responsive, and funded.

Generally, Goal 1 is satisfied when a local government follows the public involvement procedures set out in the statutes and in its acknowledged comprehensive plan and land use regulations.

The City's Development Code is consistent with State law with regards to notification requirements. Pursuant to SHMC 17.20.080 at least one public hearing before the Planning Commission and City Council is required. Legal notice in a newspaper of general circulation is also required. The City has met these requirements and notified DLCD of the proposal.

#### • Statewide Planning Goal 2: Land Use Planning.

This goal requires that a land use planning process and policy framework be established as a basis for all decisions and actions relating to the use of land. All local governments and state agencies involved in the land use action must coordinate with each other. City, county, state and federal agency and special districts plans and actions related to land use must be consistent with the comprehensive plans of cities and counties and regional plans adopted under Oregon Revised Statues (ORS) Chapter 268.

Generally, Goal 2 requires that actions related to land use be consistent with acknowledged Comprehensive Plans and coordination with affected governments and agencies and be based on an adequate factual base. The City has an adopted Comprehensive Plan, compliance of this proposal which is addressed herein. Moreover, explanation and proof of coordination with affected agencies and factual base are described herein, as well, including inventory, needs, etc.

#### • Statewide Planning Goal 11: Public Facilities and Services.

Goal 11 requires cities and counties to plan and develop a timely, orderly and efficient arrangement of public facilities and services to serve as a framework for urban and rural development. The goal requires that urban and rural development be "guided and supported by types and levels of urban and rural public facilities and services appropriate for, but limited to, the needs and requirements of the urban, urbanizable and rural areas to be served."

City water and sewer capacities are adequate to serve the subject property. This is explained above. Moreover, there is no evidence that adequate infrastructure cannot be made available to serve the annexed area if redeveloped. The existing development is adequately served.

#### • Statewide Planning Goal 12: Transportation.

Goal 12 requires cities, counties, metropolitan planning organizations, and ODOT to provide and encourage a "safe, convenient and economic transportation system." This is accomplished through development of Transportation System Plans based on inventories of local, regional and state transportation needs. Goal 12 is implemented through OAR

660, Division 12, also known as the Transportation Planning Rule ("TPR"). The TPR contains numerous requirements governing transportation planning and project development.

Traffic impacts and the City's provisions that address the TPR are explained above. This proposal will not significantly affect an existing or planned transportation facility.

(d) The subject property abuts two streets: Gable Road and McNulty Way.

City standards require such improvements. Gable Road is a developed minor arterial-classified street without frontage improvements (sidewalks, curb, landscape strip) on either side. McNulty Way is a collector-classified developed street without frontage improvements (sidewalks, curb, landscape strip) on either side.

This property is not the subject of a current development land use review, which provides the legal nexus and proportionality to require such improvements. As such, the only option is for the property owner to be required to sign and record an irrevocable consent to local improvement district, though, the applicant could improve the frontages if desired.

The existing right-of-way widths for both Gable Road and McNulty Way is sufficient for their corresponding street classification. Therefore, right-of-way dedication is not necessary.

(e) The subject property is not designated residential. Thus a needs analysis is not necessary.

**Finding**: The annexation approval criteria are met for this proposal.

#### SHMC 17.28.030 (2) – Annexation criteria

The plan designation and the zoning designation placed on the property shall be the city's zoning district which most closely implements the city's comprehensive plan map designation.

**Discussion:** The Comprehensive Plan designation is currently Unincorporated General Commercial, GC. Upon annexation, the Comprehensive Plan designation would thus be General Commercial (Incorporated). There are several zoning options under this designation, but based on the location of this property and the abutting City General Commercial zoning, the appropriate zoning would be General Commercial, GC.

**Finding**: The subject property shall be designated General Commercial (Incorporated), GC and zoned General Commercial, GC upon annexation depending on the determinations of the Commission and Council.

#### SHMC 17.112.020 – Established & Developed Area Classification criteria

- (1) Established Area.
  - (a) An "established area" is an area where the land is not classified as buildable land under OAR 660-08-0005;

- (b) An established area may include some small tracts of vacant land (tracts less than an acre in size) provided the tracts are surrounded by land which is not classified as buildable land; and
- (c) An area shown on a zone map or overlay map as an established area.
- (2) Developing Area. A "developing area" is an area which is included in the city's buildable land inventory under the provisions of OAR except as provided by subsection (1)(b) of this section.

**Discussion:** OAR 660-008-0005 generally defines "Buildable Land" as vacant residential property not constrained by natural hazards or resources, and typically not publicly owned. The subject property is not zoned residential. This provision does not apply.

**Finding**: This provision is not applicable.

#### **CONCLUSION & DECISION**

Based upon the facts and findings herein, the Council approves this annexation and that upon annexation, the subject property have a Comprehensive Plan designation of General Commercial (incorporated), GC, and be zoned General Commercial, GC, with the condition that:

The streets abutting the subject property shall be brought into compliance with City street standards (or) property owner(s) shall sign and record an irrevocable consent to a local improvement district.

*This annexation will <b>not</b> be subject to voter approv	al subsequent to this land use process.*

# AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ST. HELENS MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 8.28 REGARDING CITY DOCKS

WHEREAS, St. Helens Municipal Code Chapter 8.28 governs city docks; and

WHEREAS, City docks are intended for short term moorage and clarifications are needed to better specify the time limits on such use; and

**WHEREAS**, additional minor updates, including to the provisions related to impoundment of derelict or abandoned vessels, also are needed; and

WHEREAS, the amendments will better inform users of the limits on use and improve enforcement.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF ST. HELENS ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** Recitations. The above recitations are true and correct and are incorporated herein by this reference.
- **Section 2.** SHMC 8.28 is amended as set forth in Exhibit A to this Ordinance (additional language is <u>underlined</u> and deleted text is shown as <del>strikethrough</del>).
  - **Section 3.** This Ordinance shall be effective 30 days after its passage.

#### 8.28.020 Definitions.

(1) "Abandoned vessel" means a vessel left at the city docks in violation of the time limitations in SHMC 8.28.040 or that otherwise is not authorized to use a City dock as provided in this Code or state law. the Oregon State Marine Board certificate of number and registration requirements.

#### 8.28.040 Time limitations.

- (1) City docks shall not be\_used by a vessel for moorage, either directly to a dock or to one or more vessels that are moored to a dock, for more than <a href="five-72 cumulative-centinuous-hours in any 14">five-72 cumulative-centinuous-hours in any 14</a> calendar days-period.

  Upon expiration of the 72 hour limit, the vessel shall be moved from the dock and may not be moored to any city dock for 14 calendar days.-. not to exceed 10 calendar days per calendar month. The 72 hour five-calendar-day period shall begin with the first hour the vessel is tied or moored to any city dock, and accumulates regardless of whether or not the vessel moved from its original mooring to another position on the same or any other city dock during the 14 five-calendar-day period.
- (2) City docks are not available as a place to park an unoccupied boat. Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, city docks shall not be used by a vessel for moorage as described in subsection (1) of this section when the vessel is unoccupied, as defined herein. For the purposes of this section, an "unoccupied vessel" is a vessel that is without occupant for a continuous period of at least four hours or more between sunset and sunrise of any every night that the vessel is so moored or using a city dock.
- (3) Regardless of how long the vessel has been moored as described herein, aAny vessel that is moored in violation of this Section 8.28.040 subsection (2) of this section is hereby deemed to be in violation of this Ordinance and not authorized to moor at a city dockhave exceeded the time limitations allowed in subsection (1) of this section and is, therefore, subject to all penalties and sanctions described herein. In addition to and not in lieu of any other remedy, such vessel may be deemed abandoned as provided in Section 8.28.072. (Ord. 3151 § 1, 2011; Ord. 3147 § 1, 2011; Ord. 3087 § 3, 2008; Ord. 2888 § 4, 2003)

#### 8.28.060 Prohibited activities.

- (1) No person shall swim from or within 50 feet of the docks;
- (2) No person shall obstruct a vessel from docking;

- (3) No person shall cut, drill holes in, or attach in any manner any object other than a vessel with mooring lines to the docks without written permission from the city administrator;
- (4) No commercial activity will occur on city docks without specific authorization in the moorage agreement;
- (5) Vehicles are not allowed on city docks, except for the immediate transport of a bicycle to and from a vessel or the use of a vehicle that is necessary due to a disability. Vehicles include but are not limited to bicycles, scooters, skateboards, rollerblades, mopeds, motorcycles, or other self-propelled units;
- (6) Vessels are not allowed to use docking space designated only for emergency craft use. Such docking space is designated by a yellow stripe on the edge of the dock or by a sign or by both. The use of such space by craft other than government emergency craft is prohibited;
- (7) Fishing is allowed in the docking space designated for emergency craft use when emergency craft are not present. Persons who are fishing must yield to emergency craft;
- (8) Use a city dock for an abandoned or derelict vessel as defined herein or by state law.
- (98) Violation of any other <u>provisions of limitations\_this Chapter</u>, including <u>but not limited to the time limits in Section 8.28.0420</u>, the time limitations in this chapter. (Ord. 3147 § 2, 2011; Ord. 3087 § 8, 2008; Ord. 2888 § 6, 2003)

#### 8.28.100 Impoundment/tow.

Law enforcement officers are authorized to call for <u>seizure of a vessel</u>, including a tow or impoundment of any <u>vessel as provided in d any vessel in violation of this chapter in accordance with the ORS 830.875 to 830.895 concerning boat numbering and ORS 830.9087 through 830.94427 concerning abandoned <u>or derelict</u> boats, floating homes and boathouses. Any vessel <u>seized pursuant to this Ordinance and state law and not reclaimed as provided by state law removed by the authorization of a law enforcement officer shall be disposed of in accordance with ORS <u>98.245</u>. (Ord. 3087 § 13, 2008; Ord. 2888 § 10, 2003)</u></u>

# AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ST. HELENS MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 13 TO DEFINE THE ST. HELENS COMMUNITY RECREATION AND PARKS FEE

**WHEREAS**, St. Helens Municipal Code Chapter 13 regarding public services should include a new section called Community Recreation and Parks; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has determined that maintaining a recreation program is in the best interest of the public; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has determined that application of a community parks and recreation service fee on all utility accounts for users of city utilities would adequately support the recreation and parks ongoing expenses.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF ST. HELENS, OREGON ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

## Chapter 13.06 St. Helens Community Recreation and Parks Fee

#### Sections:

13.06.010 **Definitions.** 

13.06.020 St. Helens Community Recreation and Parks Fee.

13.06.030 Rate.

13.06.040 Uses of revenue.

#### 13.06.010 **Definitions.**

- (1) "St. Helens Community Recreation and Parks fee" or "fee" means the charge placed on all residential dwelling units or equivalent dwelling units for the purposes of funding expenses related to the City of St. Helens Recreation Program and Parks Department and future feasibility studies related to combining the Parks Department with the Recreation Program and reviewing potential funding opportunities.
- (2) "Dwelling unit (DU)" is defined by Title 17 of the St. Helens Municipal Code.
- (3) "Equivalent dwelling unit" means a nonresidential unit which is deemed equivalent to a dwelling unit as provided herein.

#### 13.06.020 St. Helens Community Recreation and Parks Fee.

- (1) There is imposed on all users of city utilities a charge known as the St. Helens Community Recreation and Parks fee. The fee is imposed by the city monthly on all utility accounts connected to city utilities.
- (2) The fee is to be set at a uniform rate and applied to each individual dwelling unit or equivalent dwelling unit for that account. The community recreation service fee is independent

of and in addition to existing fees and charges imposed as part of the standard utility rates for city accounts.

(3) The fee will be included with the utility bill as a separate and distinct charge and listed on the bill as the St. Helens Community Recreation and Parks fee. The fee is due and payable at the same time and in the same manner and method as the utility bill and associated charges, as provided for under SHMC 13.02.060.

#### 13.06.030 Rate.

- (1) The rate for the fee is to be set by a duly adopted resolution, passed by City Council following a public forum and opportunity for public comments and testimony consistent with SHMC 13.02.040.
- (2) The City Council may further revise the amount of the fee imposed in the manner set forth under Chapter 13.02 SHMC. The City Council shall review the amount of the fee annually prior to the adoption of the annual budget.

#### 13.06.040 Uses of revenue.

All revenues generated by the fee will be used for city recreation and parks programs.

4.A 7:00 p.m. - Comprehensive Plan & Text Amendments - Riverfront Connector Plan

Vice Chair Cary opened the Public Hearing at 7:01 p.m. There were no ex-parte contacts, conflicts of interests, or bias in this matter. City Planner Jacob Graichen introduced Matt Hastie of Angelo Planning Group to summarize the Riverfront Connector Plan adoption process.

Hastie explained the small changes and additions made to the Plan since the Commission last saw it, as included in the packet. Hastie said cost estimates were prepared for each segment and intersection in the project area. Commissioner Cohen asked about the 30 percent contingency. Hastie explained they use a fairly large contingency when the estimation is at a planning-level detail, as opposed to an engineering-level detail. Hastie went through each text

amendment with the Commission, as included in the staff report. The Commission thanked Hastie and Graichen and Associate Planner Dimsho for their good work on this project.

No one spoke in favor.

#### In Opposition

No one spoke in opposition.

#### **End of Oral Testimony**

There were no requests to continue the hearing or leave the record open.

#### Close of Public Hearing & Record

The applicant waived the opportunity to submit final written argument after the close of the record.

There were no other comments.

**Motion:** Upon Commissioner Webster's motion and Commissioner Semling's second, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval to the City Council of the Comprehensive Plan & Text Amendments as presented. [AYES: Vice Chair Cary, Commissioner Cohen, Commissioner Lawrence, Commissioner Semling, Commissioner Stenberg, Commissioner Webster; Nays: None]

#### 4.B 7:30 p.m. - Comprehensive Plan & Zone Amendments - Erickson & Lewis

Vice Chair Cary opened the Public Hearing at 7:35 p.m. Commissioner Lawrence declared she has a conflict of interest because she lives very close to the proposal. She recused herself from the hearing. There were no other ex-parte contacts, conflicts of interests, or bias in this matter.

Graichen described the proposal and recommended conditions of approval, as presented in the staff report. He said this application was prompted by the sale of one of the properties. The applicants would like to re-zone their properties from General Commercial (GC) to Apartment Residential (AR) so that if the existing detached single-family dwellings were destroyed, they could re-build. Detached single-family dwellings are an allowed use in AR. This will help with financing of the property.

Graichen said the preliminary findings from the Housing Needs Analysis support the re-zoning of this property to Apartment Residential, as opposed to General Residential (R5) or Moderate Residential (R7) or Suburban Residential (R10). Graichen also noted that 180 S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street is contributing to the nationally-registered historic district as a dwelling. He also said that the lots do not lend themselves well to commercial uses, given their size. Staff recommends approval of the zone change for these reasons. Commission Cohen asked if there is a limit on the size of the multi-dwellings that could be built. Graichen said yes, there are minimum lot sizes that would

limit the number of dwellings. He said it probably works out to be a triplex, if they could fit the parking requirements and prevent backward maneuvering onto S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street. [Secretary's Note: After review of the code, each lot would only be individually eligible for two dwelling units. This would be either a duplex or detached single-family dwelling with an auxiliary dwelling unit on a single lot.]

#### In Favor

**Bolen, Linda.** She works with John L. Scott Real Estate. She is the listing agent for 164 S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street. No lenders will loan on the property because it cannot be re-built if destroyed. It had to go for cash only. It did eventually sell, but without financing. She noted that 180 S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street does not have enough room for conversion to a commercial use. The best use is residential, especially given residential uses on both sides.

**Sheeley, Paula.** She is in support of the proposal. She is the new owner of 164 S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street.

#### In Opposition

No one spoke in opposition.

#### **End of Oral Testimony**

There were no requests to continue the hearing or leave the record open.

#### Close of Public Hearing & Record

The applicant waived the opportunity to submit final written argument after the close of the record.

#### **Deliberations**

The Commission feels that this request makes sense.

**Motion:** Upon Commissioner Cohen's motion and Commissioner Stenberg's second, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval to the City Council of the Comprehensive Plan & Zone Amendments as presented. [AYES: Vice Chair Cary, Commissioner Cohen, Commissioner Semling, Commissioner Stenberg, Commissioner Webster; Nays: None]

#### 5) **Discussion Items**

5.A Annual Planning Commission Report to City Council on June 5, 1:15 p.m.

Graichen asked if anyone would like to present the report to City Council or if anyone would like to add anything to the report. Commissioner Cohen asked about the violations in the Planning Department Activity Report for April. He said once a violation occurs, the damage cannot be undone. He felt that the violations on Sykes Road were inexcusable. He asked if there could be more teeth in the rules and regulations for violations. He suggested requiring a bond up front if they violate a planning decision. That way, if a decision is violated, the bond could be used to amend the violations. Commission Semling suggested a larger bond for larger projects. Commissioner Cohen thinks that St. Helens might be gaining a reputation for being loose with violators. The Commission agreed. Graichen said for the project on Sykes Road, there may be

fines imposed with the final plat, but he thinks the Sykes Road violations may have just been the incompetence of the project engineering and consulting firm.

#### 5.B Millard Road Property Zoning Discussion

Graichen said we tried to discuss the zoning of the City-owned Millard Road property at previous Commission meetings in July 2018 and August 2018, but we ran out of time. Since then, the preliminary findings from the Housing Needs Analysis (HNA) have been developed. He said the City Council held a Public Forum and the Parks Commission weighed in on what the zoning of the property should be. Now it is time for the Planning Commission to weigh in. Graichen went through introductory slides that were included in the packet. He said a 50 foot wide access easement allows access from Chase Road to the property, but if a development proposal is not received by March 2020, the easement can be terminated by the owner. There are a number of wetlands with various classifications located on the property. The Transportation System Plan (TSP) identifies a north/south connection through the property. The Parks & Trails Master Plan indicates the need for a portion of the property to be set aside as parkland. The Comprehensive Plan map shows the property as mostly Public Lands (PL) with a small northern portion as Moderate Residential (R7).

Graichen said the preliminary findings of HNA support a zone change to something other than R10 and R7, since there are surpluses in those lands. Graichen noted, however, that neighbors testified in favor of R7 or R10 at the Public Forum. He said that there is interest in Mixed Use (MU), which would allow the market to decide the amount of residential and commercial. This could help with our shortage of commercial lands identified in the Economic Opportunity Analysis (EOA) from 2008. The Parks Commission and the Columbia County Board of Commissioners support MU. Commissioner Stenberg asked about the deed restriction. Vice Chair Cary said wetlands MC-15 and MC-17 both require a deed restriction since they are both mitigation areas. Dimsho said the Parks Commission's recommendation included a park on the northern area next to McNulty Creek (remaining PL zoning), with the lower portion changing to MU zoning. She said they were in support of a trail through the property to satisfy the TSP. The Commission likes the flexibility of MU zoning for the whole property, especially since parks are an allowed use in MU.

Commissioner Stenberg suggested senior housing, cluster housing, or memory care facilities. Vice Chair Cary said the property is kind of isolated, but if a mix of uses were developed, it could work. Commissioner Cohen hopes the property is planned and developed in its entirety, rather than in pieces.

#### 6) Planning Director Decisions

Vice Chair Cary asked if there was anything special about the two-parcel partitions that were approved. Graichen said no, but he noted that there has been an increase in rowhomes being developed in St. Helens post-recession.

### 7) Planning Department Activity Report7.A April Planning Department Report

There were no comments.

#### 8) For Your Information Items

Vice Chair Cary and Dimsho discussed the 5th Street trail project. She is writing a grant to help fund the implementation of an off-street urban trail through mostly undeveloped S. 5<sup>th</sup> Street right-of-way. Last week Dimsho, Vice Chair Cary, and Engineering Director Sue Nelson traversed the right-of-way to see if the project was feasible. It was decided to phase the project, with the first phase starting from Nob Hill Nature Park and ending at the existing Tualatin Street pedestrian path. If we are successful with the grant request, the project will be a partnership with the Columbia River Youth Corps, a group of St. Helens High School students who help clear invasive plants and develop trails.

There being no further business before the Planning Commission, the meeting was adjourned at 8:39 p.m.

#### 2) Approval of Minutes

2.A Approve Minutes of April 8, 2019

**Motion:** Upon John Brewington's motion and Howard Blumenthal's second, the Commission unanimously approved the Minutes of April 8, 2019. [AYES: Howard Blumenthal, Jerry Belcher, John Brewington, Elisa Mann, Paul Barlow, Jacob Woodruff, Lynne Pettit; Nays: None]

5.A Update Bylaws

Ingram said Kathy Payne recommended they update the bylaws so changes were made in red which consisted mostly of changing the name to Parks & Trails Commission and changing the meeting frequency and week of the month.

**Motion:** Upon Howard Blumenthal's motion and Lynne Pettit's second, the Commission recommended that Council approve the updated bylaws. [AYES: Howard Blumenthal, Jerry Belcher, John Brewington, Elisa Mann, Paul Barlow, Jacob Woodruff, Lynne Pettit; Nays: None]

#### 5.B Annual Report to Council

Ingram said the Annual Report to Council was schedule for June 5<sup>th</sup> at 1:00pm and asked if anyone would like to do it. Belcher said he would but didn't want to be the lead on it and wondered if Dunn would do it again this year. Ingram said she would e-mail and ask her.

#### 5.C Skate Park & BMX Proposal - Jordan Barlow

Jordan Barlow had a proposal for renovations to the skate park and BMX track. There was a handout with a list of items they would like to see. Belcher asked what #3, Repair Concrete Box was and Jordan said that is an obstacle in the skate park and it's just gotten worn down over the years from grinding on it. He feels it is a little small and low and they make angle iron now that goes around it so that would be getting ground on instead of the concrete to prevent future wear.

Paul Barlow said he knows there were conversations about the money that was available and there were conversations with Morten about putting together items that could possibly be done. These are things that could be added or done without redoing the whole skate park. He has also contacted USA BMX to get numbers on what the cost would be to bring new dirt in and rebuild the track. They put him in touch with their track builder who is out of Eugene and he called the Eugene track which happens to be next to Autzen stadium and they charge for parking so they have a lot of money. They have agreed to pay for the track builder to come and rebuild our track but we have to come up with the dirt and equipment. He has contacted Coffman Excavation and it looks like they will be able to get all of the dirt they will need and will let him know about equipment. Hopefully he can do it in the middle of July of he can get everything put together.

**Motion:** Upon John Brewington's motion and Elisa Mann's second, the Commission unanimously recommend the Council consider approving #7 – Rebuild/Resurface BMX Track on the list of Skate Park and BMX Track Proposed Renovations. [AYES: Howard Blumenthal, Jerry Belcher, John Brewington, Elisa Mann, Paul Barlow, Jacob Woodruff, Lynne Pettit; Nays: None]

Nelson asked if on #4, the cost of the rail was supposed to be \$500 or \$5000 and Barlow said it is \$500. There are a couple of items that fall within the \$20,000 they have. Belcher asked where the \$20,000 was from and Brown said that is part of the \$500,000 CIP Projects money.

Brewington thought it would be a good idea for Nelson, Morten, Houk and Jordan Barlow should get together and go over this before presenting to Council.

Belcher said he has added all of these items up and they don't come to \$20,000. Blumenthal said not if you include the work on the skate park. Brown said there was \$20,000 to start with and they spent about \$5000 on concrete work. Nelson also reminded them that the other group that wanted to do improvements on the skate park had talked about having that money as a match in case they were able to find a grant to do improvements there. The money has not been earmarked but she wants them to be aware there is another group with interest.

#### 6) Old Business

6.A Parks Reservations and Fees

Brown had handouts with proposed times and fees for field reservations. He threw out three hour blocks as a suggestion on parks and five hour blocks on fields and listed some other options on the far right also. These are just his suggestions so they are welcome to make changes.

Woodruff said he likes the five hour blocks on fields. The 5:00 to 10:00 block would work perfectly for coed softball. Nobody had objections to any of it. Brown said if they like it, they can give him a consensus to take to the council. He is going to request the Council doesn't make any price changes until after this season since they have already taken reservations.

Keep looking for grants for upgrades.

Brewington recommends doing it as suggested and increasing McCormick Park fields 1 and 2 and Campbell fields 1 and 2 from \$5 to \$10. They are the better fields in town. Brown said if they would like to make a suggestion to have these park fees put into a separate account instead of the general fund, he can take that suggestion to the Council.

Brown said the Boise softball fields are under contract until September and he is wondering if they want to continue the agreement or open it up to City-wide use. The agreement was with Boise and transferred to the City and is with Girls Youth Softball and we have to give 30 days' notice if they want to renew the agreement. Brewington asked if Brown would present more information on it at next meeting. Houk said they are not the best fields and are used for t-ball and pitching machine girls and that league maintains them and we don't touch them.

Brown said the City is having someone come in and do a feasibility study for an RV park.

**Motion:** Upon John Brewington's motion and Jacob Woodruff's second, the Commission unanimously recommend that Council accept the staff proposal of sessions as presented except changing McCormick and Campbell softball fields fees from \$5 to \$10 per field per session. [AYES: Howard Blumenthal, Jerry Belcher, John Brewington, Elisa Mann, Paul Barlow, Jacob Woodruff, Lynne Pettit; Nays: None]

Morten stated Sand Island is now a camping area and a certain amount of the money will be coming back to the City and he thought they should know that if they are considering a park fund. Brown said they could make their motion to include camping reservations from other park facilities.

**Motion:** Upon Jacob Woodruff's motion and John Brewington's second, the Commission unanimously recommend to Council that all parks fees including Sand Island camping fees generated by the parks system go into a separate account for Parks instead of the General Fund. [AYES: Howard Blumenthal, Jerry Belcher, John Brewington, Elisa Mann, Paul Barlow, Jacob Woodruff, Lynne Pettit; Nays: None]

6.B Park Report - 6th Street Field - postponed to June

#### 4) Councilor's Report

Through structuring with Neal Sheppeard retiring, Nelson is interim Public Works Director. Prior to Sheppeard being Co-PW Director, he was Public Works Supervisor and Dave Elder will be assuming that position and will report to Nelson. Houk will report to Nelson. Houk and Elder will be peer management for Parks as Parks uses Public Works people a lot. Nelson said these group works very well together and depend on each other for equipment and manpower and help during storm events.

Belcher said they presented the Urban Trail to the Council and afterwards Morten said Dimsho was looking for grant money from Nike to run trail through 5th Street and he is wondering if Morten can fill them in. Morten said they don't know anything yet as it takes quite some time to prepare grants and deliver it and its being worked on. He knows the Council will want to take look at a final plan sometime and if that includes both 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Streets, that would be to their advantage. Nike grant is just for 5th Street. He thinks Dimsho should come to the next meeting and report on it. Nelson walked the whole thing with Dimsho and Dan Carey on Planning Commission and he is with DSL so has a good understanding of wetlands and areas they should avoid. There are some challenges because of wetlands and elevation changes so that area might have to be done in phases and the costs may be higher. They were able to walk the whole way without going on to anyone's property but will be challenging to put a trail in there.

Morten said they had one Councilor who was very outspoken with the recommendation of Godfrey Park about letting people/kids into the canyon to explore and have fun. That caused a bit of controversy. Brewington asked if liability was brought up and Morten said yes but from that Councilor's point of view, it didn't matter. That was the one dissenting vote and he didn't feel good about the maintenance of the park plan. Everyone else seemed to favor it.

#### 7) **Discussion Items**

Belcher said that back in the 70s, there was a car that went off the cliff between 1st & 2nd off Wyeth. It rolled backwards off the cliff and there was a baby in the car that fell out and wasn't hurt and the car went all the way to the bottom. Shortly after, there was a rail put in from 1st to 2<sup>nd</sup> Street. Then Keith Locke said someone else fell off the cliff right at the top of the trail last summer. From 2nd, there is a very steep drop-off for about 75 yards past the end of the rail. We are looking at putting trail along there and he thinks City should put a chain link fence along the top of Grey Cliffs because since it's been cleared off, it's quite a drop off now. He thinks it's a liability with putting the Urban Trail in there. He also thinks they should put a fence along where they step off on the trail. Nelson said that was understandable if we put a trail in there. Belcher said it is dangerous now and a liability. Morten will take it to Council in his report.

Barlow reminded them that the Bike Safety Fair is on May 18th at St. Frederik's. He will not be there but Jordan will be there manning a booth.

#### 8) Other Business

Blumenthal said there is a native plant walk at Dalton this coming Saturday. He wants to talk to Paul Gerdes about poison oak spraying. We had talked about benches for Nob Hill and at one point said there was money for them so was wondering on the status. Houk said the benches aren't the problem. Digging the holes in the rock where they want them is the problem.

Houk said the Campbell restrooms are rehabbed except for touch-up paint.

#### 1) 1:00 P.M. - Call Work Session to Order

#### 2) Visitor Comments - Limited to five (5) minutes per speaker

- William Dugaard "Willow Bill". He distributed a handout to the Council. A copy is included in the archive meeting packet. He requested a YouTube video of the Flying Eagle Canoe done by Nicole Thill be shown. It can be viewed at <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=gXhqjn3krMw">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=gXhqjn3krMw</a>. Fun times are had on the Eagle. Willow Bill spoke to the Grand Ronde Nation about offering something in coordination with the City. He is waiting to hear back. They would like to do a number of events with the Flying Eagle on the Waterfront property. He asked if they can borrow a 10x20 tent.
- Les Watters. On behalf of the Museum Association, he thanked the Council for the honor of being grand marshal in the parade. However, he is here on a different issue. He referred to a map and showed the area where fill is being dumped at the end of N. 2nd Street. He brought it up to the Planning Commission in the past but now it's happening again. He encouraged the City to create a long-range plan for that area. He does recall the discussion about emergency access and bicycle paths.

Council President Morten responded that there has been discussions with Public Works about that serving as ingress and egress for the marina area. In case of fire, it gives an additional access. The only plan was to get it filled so it can be used.

Les reiterated the need for a plan and neighborhood input. Discussion ensued.

- Pat Trapp, Port of Columbia County.
  - Approved the Devinaire lease.
  - Approved the budget for the next year.
  - Approved a change to the next energy site development and option program.
  - Received the LUBA decision for the rezoned property. The Court of Appeals found that LUBA was correct in their decision. They found in favor of the Port for eight of nine of the things. That one will go back to the County for a decision.

Council President Morten asked when his term up. Pat responded that it's up at the end of this month. Morten thanked Pat for all of his reports. Mayor Scholl thanked Pat as well.

Councilor Locke asked Pat how many trains are anticipated to come through here in the next five years. Pat said there have been three ethanol trains per month since November 2015. Councilor Topaz asked how many cars there are per train. Pat said that Port Westward deals in unit trains, which is normally 104-110 cars per train. However, that can change based on the product.

Council President Morten spoke of how the Port approved a maximum amount of train traffic that could pass through. Pat confirmed that it was passed in 2013 and has not been amended. The first one allowed them no more than 24 trains per month. Five years later, the rail improved and they are now allowed up to 32 trains per months.

Council President Morten asked if there are times that train traffic is allowed to pass-through. Pat responded that there is no prescribed schedule for unit trains that service the Port's tenants. However, they have worked with Portland & Western Rail to try to avoid certain times; such as rush hours and school start and end times.

#### 3) **Discussion Topics**

3.A Columbia County Economic team Semi-Annual Report - Chuck Daughtry, Executive Director

Chuck Daughtry, Executive Director of the Columbia County Economic Team, was in attendance to give the semi-annual report. A copy is included in the archive meeting packet.

Mayor Scholl often hears from people in the community...[Secretary's note: about needing industry in St. Helens]. He asked Chuck and Pat to elaborate. Chuck responded that there were a number of companies interested in the Boise site when he got here. However, there was a shift when the City acquired it and they weren't able to market it as well. They did bring in Cascades Tissue. The rock issue made it difficult to develop. Pat elaborated on business attraction and expansion on Port properties. There have also been challenges working with the City on permits. They will continue working to draw businesses here. Discussion ensued. Mayor Scholl thanked Chuck and Pat for they work they're doing.

### 3.B Annual CDBG Revolving Loan Fund Program Report – Susan Wagner, C.A.T.

Susan Wagner with the Community Action Team was in attendance to give the report.

- Partnered with St. Helens for housing rehabilitation since 1984
- Revolving Loan Program provides 0% interest and low payments
- Loans are paid back when the home is sold or after 30 years
- Funds health and safety repairs
- Currently have 29 homes
- Four loans were paid off last year
- Need to preserve existing affordable housing
- Healthy Homes Programs helps fund repairs for people on the Oregon Health Plan
- Self-Help Owner Occupied Rehab Program allows homeowners to do the work themselves at a much reduced cost
- Completed the Veterans Home Repair Program in March
- Assisted three families with the down payment assistance program
- The 16-unit homeless housing on N. 18<sup>th</sup> Street is almost complete. An open house will be held July 19.

#### 3.C Planning Commission/Historic Landmarks Committee Annual Report

City Planner Graichen was present to give the report. A copy is included in the archive meeting packet.

- Held 11 meetings over the last year.
- Acceptance Agenda items almost double compared to the prior year.
- Reviewed projects in process.
- Reviewed future projects/plans.
- Requested the requirement of a bond or something to pay for potential enforcement issues that come about with projects. That will need to be discussed further.

#### 3.E Discussion regarding Millard Road Property - Jacob

City Planner Graichen reviewed his memo and attachments. A copy is included in the archive meeting packet. He recommends the northern portion remain Public Lands (PL) for the park. There was a lot of support for a park at the public forum along the creek. One idea that the County concurs with is to zone the remaining property Mixed Use (MU) so the use is driven by the market. A public hearing for the zone change will be needed. They can propose MU or Moderate Residential (R7) to remain status quo with the surrounding area. The neighbors expressed desire for Suburban Residential (R10). He does not recommend zoning it R10.

Discussion ensued. This will go to the Parks & Trails Commission for their review as well. Council concurred with the northern portion being zoned PL and the remaining MU.

- 3.D Request from Port to Provide Letter of Support for Site Certification Program City Administrator Walsh explained the Port's request. A copy of the request and draft letter are included in the archive meeting packet. Council concurred.
- 3.F Discussion regarding Proposed Amendments to Dock Regulations John City Administrator Walsh presented the proposed dock regulation amendments. A copy of the proposed ordinance and amendments are included in the archive meeting packet. Discussion ensued. There is a need to increase safety at the docks as well.

#### 4) **Department Reports**

Police Chief Greenway reported...

- June's First Thursday is tomorrow. The topic is Interaction with the Police Department.
- There will not be a First Thursday in July.
- Met with Sheriff Brian Pixley this morning. They have entered a verbal agreement to use the County boat. They are researching securing a vessel for the City to access Sand Island. An MOU was found from 2001 that already allowed this but it refers to a boat that is no longer in service. They will be updating the MOU.
- Detective Dustin King is a certified boat instructor and will train all of our officers on water safety. There will be minimal cost for training.

Public Works Interim Director Nelson reported...

- The Gable Road project is getting ready to start. The utility work taking place now is separate from the County construction project. They plan to begin as soon as school is out. There will be some delays and detours.
- The Plymouth Street project is almost complete. It does need to be paved and should be open by 4<sup>th</sup> of July for access.
- Some of the brush and grass along the roadways is not getting done as quickly as it normally does. Their one mower that is able to do the roadside mowing is broken. It will take at least a month to repair. They have reached out to the County. They have four but two are broken. They have agreed to let us borrow one when they complete a project in the next week or two.

Councilor Topaz asked Nelson not to mow the blackberries going around the curve on Old Portland Road. Nelson responded that they will try to limit the mowing. They do have to mow that area to maintain the infrastructure. Councilor Locke added the need to keep it mowed so it doesn't get closer to the street.

Library Director Jeffries reported...

• The summer reading programs begin June 17. The theme is Universe of Stories. The 50th anniversary of the moon landing is in July. The programs focus around space and the universe.

Finance Director Brown reported...

 Asked if the Council would like to hold a public forum for the Recreation Program fee on Monday, June 24. There is a availability at the school district. Council concurred to holding the meeting on that Monday at 6 p.m. City Recorder Payne reported...

- Three upcoming street closures:
  - Celebration of Life on Eilertson Street in front of Fast Boyz Detailing, June 9, 10 a.m. 9 p.m.
  - Kiwanis Parade on Columbia Blvd. from Highway 30 to S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street to the Waterfront Property, June 15, 11 a.m. – 2:30 p.m.
  - o Block Party between 301-325 S. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, July 4, 2 p.m. − 11 p.m.

#### Events Coordinator Curry reported...

- Met with Heather about the Spirit of Halloweentown parade. It's looking like the first weekend of October will be their busiest weekend.
- Tomorrow is the first night of 13 Nights on the River. The St. Helens High School Jazz Band and Hit Machine will be performing. She hopes to not have to tow any vehicles this year.
- The Wine and Art Walk is held on the second Sunday of the month, 11 a.m. 3 p.m., on S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street. Additional businesses have been added.
- Working with Brad for Sand Island Adventure and the campground. It will be available online for people to rent campsites.
- Working on a Spirit of Halloweentown Fan Club.
- Stephanie Patterson and Christina Sullivan are helping to coordinate vendors and suppliers. They are working on a video and radio commercial. There are new programs businesses will be able to participate in that are far-reaching for Columbia County.

Councilor Topaz expressed concerns that he's heard from people that Sand Island cannot be accessed unless you go through Bad. He asked for that to be clarified to the public. Curry responded that Brad is basically the director. If someone wants to do more than just day use on the Island, they should contact him. She suggested people go to www.discovercolumbiacounty.com for details. Discussion ensued. Overnight campers will need to pay a fee. There is no fee to take the shuttle over and back.

#### City Administrator Walsh reported...

- Tonight's agenda includes a resolution in support of the County's grant application to the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department for recreational trail development at the Salmonberry Lake property. The City will remain in control of the property.
- Shoestring Players proposed a theater space in the County's Rose Garden. They have since leased space on S. 1<sup>st</sup> Street. Walsh has been communicating with the new owners of the adjacent building about using that area and the wall as a theater space during community events. Council was in agreement to explore the idea further.

#### 5) Council Reports

Councilor Locke reported...

- He and Walsh met with Cascades last week. They talked about what would be done
  during the shutdown June 10 14. The parking lot will be about three quarters full of
  utility poles during that time. Softball field users will have to park in the gravel lot and
  walk over. Hamer will be doing a lot of the work and requested to use the back parking
  lot. They requested a City key to get back there. Locke gave one to Cascades.
- At the last Community Action Team (CAT) meeting, they discussed concerns staff have with security at the Warming Center. He asked Chief Greenway if officers could patrol that area or even talk to staff about what to do. Greenway responded that he will make sure officers do additional patrols and stop by.

• This could be one of the worst fire seasons ever if it stays dry. Are there any preventative measures to burn in problematic areas? Mayor Scholl suggested that's a question for the fire department and if they have sufficient staffing to oversee it.

#### Councilor Topaz reported...

Councilor Locke took him over to the mill. It's the worst he's ever seen. There are OSHA
concerns that need to be addressed. Councilor Locke added that he plans to take
Building Official Mike De Roia and Fire Marshal Jeff Pritcher over to tour the mill.

#### Council President Morten...

• Responding to Les Watters' testimony, Morten requested that Planning and Public Works work together on a comprehensive plan for the ingress and egress of Wyeth Street. He expressed concerns about pedestrians, cyclists, and emergency vehicles needing to get out of that area. That could be a one-way egress to control the traffic. He would like to see a plan developed within a one-year time frame. Nelson confirmed that there is a tentative plan for a one-way egress that would come out of the back of the upper RV park. Limited amounts of fill are being put that area now. They do have a fill permit. Council concurred.

#### Mayor Scholl reported...

- Directed guestions to reporter Nicole Thill:
  - Asked if she was notified of the Executive Session and did not attend. Nicole confirmed that is correct.
  - Nicole expressed that she would be happy to talk after the meeting. She does not believe this pertains to public business.

City Planner Graichen presented the staff report. A copy is included in the archive meeting packet.

Council members had no conflicts of interest or bias in this matter. There were no objections from the audience for the Council to make a fair decision.

Graichen introduced Consultant Matt Hastings of Angelo Planning Group. Matt reviewed a short PowerPoint presentation, a copy of which is available in the archive meeting packet.

Council President Morten asked about whether or not the design could be amended if needed. Matt said yes. Their designs are conceptual and can be shifted during a detailed design process. Morten is specifically referring to segment 2.2 on slide number three. There was a sinkhole in that area that has been repaired. He pointed out Councilor Topaz's concerns about that area being vulnerable to future sinkholes. There is water coming off of the cliff. There has been discussion about taking part of that cliff away. Is it open to further conversation about a potential hazard in that area? There would also be a better line of site with the cliff pushed back. Matt said yes. That area is the most constrained in terms of width of right-of-way. The design could be modified with more right-of-way width.

Councilor Topaz voiced his concerns:

- That area is dangerous with bike lines on both sides and crossing at a blind corner. For safety, the bike paths should remain consistent from Highway 30 to downtown.
- Do not have a definitive number of streets on the Waterfront.
- There is a round-a-bout to direct you to Old Portland Road or Plymouth Street. There needs to be one direct path to downtown and this plan does not do that.
- The building heights on the Waterfront was limited because 20 families didn't want tall buildings. That blew away \$20 million worth of permits. We're subjecting the City to 20 people's likes or dislikes.
- The wastewater treatment plant will be going away in the near future. To say we can't move the road because there are pipes over there is another design fault.
- There are problems with a non-welcoming entrance off of Highway 30.
- Need to enhance industrial growth with easy access for trucks.
- People won't come if there's not easy access.

Mayor Scholl explained that a Gateway Corridor already exists at Columbia Blvd. and St. Helens Street. This is in addition for future growth, like a loop such as what you see in Cannon Beach.

Discussion ensued. Matt pointed out that many of Councilor Topaz's concerns were raised during the design process. They had extensive conversations with the advisory committee and the public about the designs. The bicycle plans do vary throughout the corridor in response to conditions in the corridor. It was intentional. If you wanted to take a consistent approach throughout the corridor, it would be a different set of designs. If the Council wants to recommend changes, they can do so. They were very careful to safely accommodate truck traffic with Port input. Safety was their first priority.

Mayor Scholl thanked Matt for the great work he has done. Councilor Carlson acknowledged the outreach and the challenge to develop in the area. Decisions need to be made based on conditions and recommendations from the experts. Councilor Locke likes the plan and that it can be amended as needed.

#### **Public Comments**

• <u>Frank Brandon</u>. He asked how the cost estimates take inflation into consideration, seeing as how not all of the projects can be done at this time.

Graichen explained that they use a federal website to calculate inflation, such as what they have done with projects and estimates associated with the Transportation Systems Plan.
